Drama

- 1. In what ways and to what effect do at least two plays you have studied explore the idea of change and/or transformation?
- 2. Compare the use and effects of formal and informal speech in at least two of the plays you have studied

Poetry

- **3.** One poet said "I write to preserve things I've thought/felt/seen". With close reference to **at least two** poets in your study, show how effectively they have captured particular thoughts, feelings and sights and for what purpose.
- **4.** To what extent and in what ways do the works of **at least two** poets you have studied explore the tension between harmony and discord?

Prose: The Novel and Short Story

- **5.** Explore the presentation and significance of "small moments" in **at least two** of the works you have studied.
- 6. "An antagonist in literature is usually someone who actively opposes or is hostile to the protagonist." Consider the presentation and importance of one or more antagonists in **at least two** of the works you have studied

Prose: Other than the Novel and Short Story

- 7. Explore the presentation and importance of the idea of "home" in at least two works you have studied.
- 8. "It is not the quality of the writing but our curiosity about the subject matter which prompts us to read works of non-fiction." How have at least two works you have studied confirmed and/or challenged the view expressed in this statement?

General Questions on Literature

- 9. In what ways and to what effect does innocence feature as a concern in **at least two** of the works you have studied?
- 10. Consider the use and effects of irony and/or humour in at least two of the works you have studied.
- 11. Commitment is often a focus in literary works. How and to what end is commitment presented in at least two of the works you have studied?
- 12. "All works of literature need a clear structure and a central theme." To what extent does your study of at least two writers support this view? In what ways and to what effect do they include both features?
